Quorn Neighbourhood Plan - 'Open event'

Quorn Neighbourhood Plan group held its first Open Day at Quorn Village Hall on Saturday 19th August. The Hall buzzed with conversation as, over the course of three hours, 157 members of the public came along to find out more about what it was all about and declared their view on the priorities for the village and how they saw the future development of housing and employment opportunities.

The Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee made up of local volunteers and a few Parish councillors took on board the comments and the process will now move forward with various sub-groups looking in detail at the local situation and developing policies for the Neighbourhood Plan.

“ I was delighted with the turnout” said the chairman of the Advisory Committee, Dennis Marchant. “It showed that there is a real love of this village and a determination to keep, and even improve upon, its best features”.

Local children from St Bartholomew’s CE primary school had worked on a potential design for a logo for the Neighbourhood Plan and expressed their own pride in Quorn and a wish to look after the environment for the future.

There will be a lot of work to do now and everyone in the village will receive a questionnaire in the months ahead giving them opportunity to input into the Plan.

Quorn Neighbourhood Plan ‘Next Steps Open Day’

The Quorn Neighbourhood Plan ‘Next Steps Open Day’ was held on Saturday 24 March 2018. Before the doors were opened Dennis Marchant, the Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee Chair presented Paul Goodman the Parish Council Administration Assistant who was retiring with a small gift and card from the committee and thanked him for his guidance and support of the Quorn NP process. It was a cold and wet morning but still over 140 residents took the time and trouble to come and agree or disagree with the emerging policies and to speak to the team of volunteers. Gary Hughes Parish Council Chairman, Hilary Fryer County Councillor, Richard Sheppard Borough Councillor and Nicky Morgan MP also called in to add their support.

The findings will now be analysed by Yourlocale our consultants and the ‘pre-submission’ draft document prepared ready for presentation to all the stakeholders including the residents for comment. The dates of the six-week pre-submission consultation will be in line with Regulation 14 of The Neighbourhood Planning Regulations (2012) and will be publicised soon.

June 2018

An update from the Quorn Neighbourhood Plan team

If you are thinking that you haven't seen or heard much about the Neighbourhood Plan of late, well you would be correct. This is not that work has stopped, it hasn't it has been a busy time putting together the Plan which is now in its Pre-Submission Draft form and was approved by the Advisory Committee on 11 June and is being presented to the Parish Council for their approval on 16 July. The aim is that the public consultation will commence at the end of July when all the stakeholders and residents will have the chance to comment on the Plan. The village will be informed where, when and how to comment in due course.

The delay, in part is due to Charnwood Borough Councils decision to introduce a new Local Plan consultation document. It is necessary to have a housing target to work to over the Neighbourhood Plan period and this is needed to know how many homes to allocate in the Plan. Ordinarily, we must meet the targets specified in the Local Plan as Neighbourhood Plans cannot promote fewer houses than CBC require. The discussion document 'Towards a Local Plan for Charnwood' published in April 2018 identifies the need for housing growth up to 2036, it is this document that the Plan must comply with. The document identifies a range of new home numbers for the Borough up to 2036. It identifies options for distributing this level of growth but doesn't establish Parish-wide targets so, it has been necessary for the team to put together a Methodology Document which is now complete and has been presented to CBC who it is hoped will agree the approach.

A NEW YEAR & NEW CHAPTER!

Quorn Library will begin a new chapter early in 2017 when it transfers to larger premises on Rawlins' campus and is run by volunteers under a community management agreement with Leicestershire County Council...

Rawlins Academy, the County Council and Quorn Parish Council are working in partnership to avoid disruption to the village library service and support the team of volunteers working to make the move a success.

The library's new home will be accessible equally from Loughborough Road on foot, as now, and by car via Sarson Street, with on-site parking.

The volunteers plan to increase the opening hours from fourteen to twenty-one per week spread over seven three hour sessions, including evenings and Saturday mornings.

The volunteer-led children's activities were successfully started last term and are continuing in the Scout Hut on the corner of Meeting Street.

The new premises will be able to host these, allowing children to borrow books to take home with them.

It is hoped that activities for other groups may take place there in the future.

The key to the success of the new venture will be the commitment and enthusiasm of the volunteers. As it will be two years since expressions of interest were received from potential volunteers, the team is all too aware that some of these early supporters may no longer be available to help. Likewise, we suspect that there are those yet to volunteer who may now be able to do so. Full training is being provided by County Council library staff in January, with ongoing support of various kinds thereafter.


QUORN LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Hi-Tech Award for Local Lad

Winner of the 2017 UK Young Engineer of the Year award is 16 year old David Bernstein from Quorn...

David and his school colleague, Sankha Kahagala-Gamage, invented the Ei after witnessing someone having a seizure. David and Sankha teamed up to develop the device, which monitors heart rate variability and body temperature, to predict a fit up to eight minutes in advance. If a seizure is detected, the vest sends a text message to the wearer's phone, and that of a carer, to warn them that help is needed.

David and his colleague presented their pioneering invention to key decision makers and leading medical professionals at the Royal Society of Medicine, and also showcased their invention at the EU Contest for Young Scientists in Estonia.

It has been an incredible year for David having won the UK Big Bang Competition and now the Young Engineer of the Year award. Congratulations!



Quorn Neighbourhood Plan 1st Annual Report

Following Quorn's formal designation as a Neighbourhood Plan Area by Charnwood Borough Council on 21 December 2016 the Parish Council Planning Scrutiny Committee took on the role of steering group to take the programme forward assisted by consultants 'Yourlocale'.

From the outset we wanted to maximise on the talents of the residents of Quorn and to involve as many people as possible in the process. Also, we made a commitment that we would be grant funded and there would be no cost to the parish residents and to that end grants have been gratefully received from both Locality and the National Lottery.

At our first public event on May Day there were encouraging signs that this would be a community project. Our marquee in Stafford Orchard received a constant stream of visitors who were only too willing to leave us their views on what was good and what was not so good about living in Quorn. Fourteen of whom were serious enough to sign up as potential Advisory Committee members.

The first Advisory Committee meeting took place on 15 May and the committee now consists of twenty members (15 volunteers and 5 councillors). Three working groups were set up to develop a Vision Statement, a Logo and Questionnaires.

19 August was a memorable day as it was the Open Event held in the Village Hall and attracted more than 150 people apparently, something of a record for such events. The visitors openly expressed their comments and views, and these were summarised in the Consultation Summary report.

At the event, the Vision Statement was presented and accepted. Logos had been produced by groups of students at St Bartholomew's School and visitors to the event had a chance to select their choice. It was a very close call, but one was finally selected, it was enhanced for publication by a parent from the school and the two designers were presented with certificates and the school an award at an assembly in November.

The next significant milestone was the Questionnaires, these were available 'on line' but with paper copies provided at the Parish Office and Community Library and available for home delivery and collection on request. The Young Persons' Survey was for those aged up to 18. There were 404 responses to the adult questionnaire representing the views of 556 people. This is a return from 13% of the adult population. There were 64 responses to the young people's questionnaire, which is over 7% of the young people's population. The results exceeded our expectations and are good for a parish the size of Quorn. The results are currently being analysed.

Four specialist theme groups Housing, Transport and Traffic, Environment and Community Facilities were established in August when more volunteers joined, their work is continuing, analysing what you have told us plus gathering their own evidence.

There is still much work to be done and in 2018 we look forward to welcoming everyone to our Next Steps Open Day in the village hall on Saturday 24th March 2017, 10.00am-1.00pm this will be your chance to review the proposed policies that will influence the future planning decisions for Quorn. The volunteers will be available to answer any questions and talk to you about their interesting work.
